

Equalities (Disabled) Volunteer Officer

The Equalities (Disabled) Volunteer Officer shall sit on the Union's Executive Council, alongside the Sabbatical Officers, representing and championing the rights and views of all 17,000+ students at the University of Stirling.

The University of Stirling Student Union Equalities (Disabled) Volunteer Officer is a fixed-term 12-month voluntary elected role, operating within the Equalities Zone. The Volunteer Officer roles are designed to be flexible and fit around your studies, with all core responsibilities taking no more than 10 hours a month.

All newly elected Volunteer Officers will begin their roles on 1st June 2023, and will be supported with induction and training throughout.

Am I eligible to stand for Equalities (Disabled) Volunteer Officer?

For the Volunteer Officer roles, you need to be a matriculated University of Stirling student at the time of the Union Elections, and until June 2024 at least.

What does the Equalities (Disabled) Volunteer Officer role involve?

- Organise at least two events to promote awareness of the disabled equality movement.
- Collaborate with relevant Union staff/Sabbaticals and University departments and self-defining disabled students to deliver campaigns that further the disabled movement and support self-defining disabled students.
- To work with the Sabbatical Officers and Union Staff, to help embed equality of opportunity within all areas of the Union's services, activities, campaigns and initiatives in order to provide an inclusive and supportive environment for all students at the University.
- To seek collaboration with external organisations and charities to promote and host local and National events and campaigns.
- Deliver change projects and campaigns based on your manifesto.
- Ensure the implementation of, and adherence to, an effective [Equality, Diversity and Inclusion policy](#).

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- Attend all appropriate training events and conferences to ensure familiarity with their role and current issues affecting students.

I want to stand for Equalities (Disabled) Volunteer Officer, what next?

1. Submit Nomination

Nominations will open at **10:00 GMT on 31st January 2023**, you can submit your nomination online through stirlingstudentunion/elections where you'll be asked to provide:

- a. Your candidate photo
- b. Your manifesto
- c. Download, complete and return the Officer Code of Conduct form to natalie.hay@stir.ac.uk

The deadline for you to complete your nomination is **12:00 GMT on 14th February 2023**.

2. Nomination Confirmation

Once your nomination has been submitted and you have returned your completed Officer Code of Conduct form, we will confirm your nomination via email.

3. Candidate Briefing

Following the close of nominations, you will be invited to a Candidate Briefing where the Deputy Returning Officer shall communicate all important information to you on the Election process and answer any questions. If you cannot attend this meeting, you can send a representative on your behalf.

4. Candidate Support

We would also encourage Volunteer Officer Candidates to arrange a time to speak with the current Sabbatical Officer or a member of staff within the Students' Union. 5. Campaigning and Voting Period

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Campaigning begins at **10:00 GMT on the 21st of February**. Voting then opens at **10:00 GMT on the 28th of February** and closes at **17:00 GMT on the 2nd of March** with results being announced the following day.
