EDUCATION VOLUNTEER OFFICERS

The Education Volunteer Officers shall sit on the Union's Executive Council, alongside the Sabbatical Officers, representing and championing the rights and views of all 18,500+ students at the University of Stirling.

The University of Stirling Education Volunteer Officers are fixed-term 12-month voluntary elected roles, operating within the Education Zone. The Volunteer Officer roles are designed to be flexible and fit around your studies.

All newly elected Volunteer Officers will begin their roles on 1st June 2024, and will be supported with induction and training throughout.

Am I eligible to stand for one of the Education Volunteer Officer roles?

For the Volunteer Officer roles, you need to be a matriculated University of Stirling student at the time of the Union Elections, and until June 2025 at least.

- Engagement Volunteer Officer
- Mature Students' Volunteer Officer
- Parents and Carers Volunteer Officer

What do the Education Volunteer Officer roles involve?

- Deliver change projects and campaigns based on your manifesto.
- Ensure the implementation of, and adherence to, an effective [Equality, Diversity and Inclusion policy](#).
- Attend all appropriate training events and conferences to ensure familiarity with their role and current issues affecting students.

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I want to stand for an Education Volunteer Officer role, what next?

1. Submit Nomination

Nominations will open at **10:00 GMT on 11th December 2023**, you can submit your nomination online through stirlingstudentunion/elections where you'll be asked to provide:

- a. Your candidate photo
- b. Your manifesto
- c. Your campaign slogan

You can edit this anytime until the deadline. The deadline for you to complete your nomination is **10:00 GMT on 12th February 2024**.

2. Sign your Officer Code of Conduct

All candidates are required to sign the Officer Code of Conduct. You can find and agree to the Officer Code of Conduct by [completing this form](#).

The deadline for you to complete your Officer Code of Conduct is **10:00 GMT on 12th February 2024**.

3. Nomination Confirmation

Once your nomination has been submitted and you have completed your Officer Code of Conduct form, we will confirm your nomination via email.

4. Candidate Briefing

Following the close of nominations, you will be invited to a Candidate Briefing where the Deputy Returning Officer shall communicate all important information to you on the Election process and answer any questions. If you cannot attend this meeting, you can send a representative on your behalf.

5. Candidate Support

There is support available to all candidates, including access to a range of candidate guides and workshops which can be found on the [Students' Union website](#).

We would also strongly encourage all Volunteer Officers to arrange a time to speak with the current Sabbatical Officer or a member of staff within the Students' Union. You can arrange this one-to-one meeting via the [Union Elections Booking page](#). You can use this meeting to find out more about the Volunteer Officer role, and the Students' Union can offer advice on your manifesto and campaign planning while answering any of your questions.

6. Campaigning and Voting Period

Campaigning begins at **10:00 GMT on the 20th of February 2024**. Voting then opens at **10:00 GMT on the 27th of February 2024** and closes at **17:00 GMT on the 29th of February 2024** with results being announced the following day.
